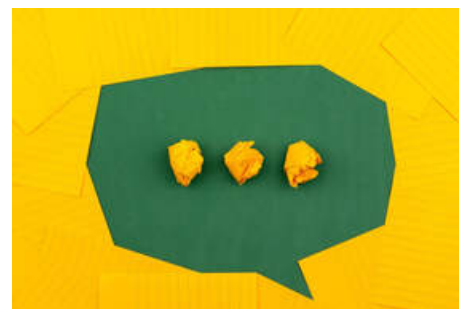

Please help support the resolution to form a United States Commission on Truth, Racial Healing, and Transformation!

Based on work by [Dr. Gail Christopher](#) and the initial [Truth, Racial Healing and Transformation \(TRHT\) coalition](#), which was spearhead by the Kellogg Foundation in partnership with 144+ organizations—including us at **Health Equity Initiative**—a resolution to introduce a Truth, Racial Healing and Transformation (TRHT) Commission was introduced to the U.S. congress.

This proposed commission aims to examine the impact of slavery, systemic racism and their influence on our nation's policies. 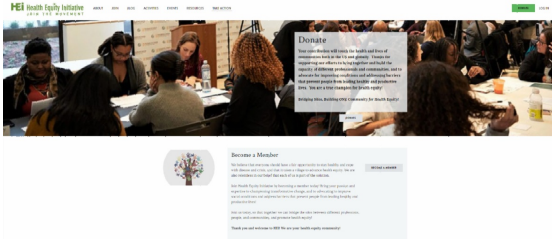
